The Stanford Prison Experiment – Phillip Zimbardo

Please write at least two sides (600 words) and answer the following:

Discuss what happened in Zimbardo's Stanford Prison Experiment and how it has been criticised.

Suggested plan:

- 1. Explain the procedures what happened in the experiment, e.g. how the sample was selected, how participants were tested beforehand, what prisoners and guards had to wear.
- 2. Explain the findings What happened? It had to be stopped after 6 days why?
- 3. Explain what the results seem to suggest about human nature how important the power of the situation is anyone could become brutal in a particular situation?
- 4. Evaluation what is the problem with the sample used? They volunteered... were they really `ordinary guys'?
- 5. Evaluation How many guards really became tyrannical? Is there really evidence that the prison situation caused everyone involved to behave brutally?
- 6. Evaluation Did Zimbardo in fact design the study perhaps to encourage guards to behave in particular ways and thus confound the experiment?
- 7. Evaluation what happened when they tried to reproduce the results more recently in the BBC study? What does this suggest about the validity of Zimbardo's findings?
- 8. Evaluation any other points of discussion, e.g. ethics, did Zimbardo generally overemphasise the role of the situation in behaviour? Can you relate this experiment to modern day equivalents such as `Love Island'? See last ref. below.
- 9. Conclusion brief conclusion how valid and useful is the study?
